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and students, or with scholars and pastors whom he had met in the course of a long and busy life. The letters to members of his family, and his reference to them in other correspondence show an affection for them which is coupled with a Christian concern for their continued growth in the knowledge and love of God.

Those who have read E. Busch's biography of Barth will find fascinating additional information. For example, Barth, learning that the original of the Barmen declaration is displayed in Bielefeld museum, asks 'is this really the text that I drew up while the Lutherans slept?' (p. 15) and the note informs us that two of the working party took a siesta while Barth drafted the 6 theses!

The author's over-riding theological interest emerges often in his correspondence. Two things seemed particularly significant to this reader: the first was Barth's determination to understand the next generation of theologians, and the second his continued interest in ecumenical work, especially his links with Hans Küng and the Roman Catholic church. In 1964, while in hospital recovering from an operation he read J. Moltmann's *Theology of Hope* and wrote offering an initial theological critique; and later that year he read W. Pannenberg's *Jesus, God and Man* at one sitting, reacting adversely to an attempt to begin christology with the Jesus of historical research. Fifteen months later his invitation to E. Jüngel to attend the eightieth birthday celebrations recognises him as one of the younger theologians who is able to take his work further. Events have overtaken the apparent growing agreement between Protestant and Roman Catholic traditions as Barth and Küng came to understand one another, and to find common ground. Küng's repudiation by his own church has posed the question how far either theologian spoke for his own tradition.

This collection portrays a theologian giving impromptu and formal reflections on a great variety of topics, and one must be grateful that these documents were preserved and made available in this way.

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The Adequacy of Christian Ethics. By BRIAN HEBBLETHWAITE. London, Marshall Morgan and Scott, 1981. Pp. 144. £5.95.

HAVING begun to read *The Adequacy of Christian Ethics* with a prejudice against a book which attempts to cover so much ground in so few pages, I ended with reluctant admiration that Brian Hebblethwaite has succeeded in the task so well. The discussion covers both critics and exponents of the moral implications of Christian teaching from the eighteenth century to the present day, including a side glance at other world religions.
